An Exciting Year for Florida PLT

I was honored to join Florida Project Learning Tree (PLT) as the Coordinator in November 2018. I say I'm honored because, wow, what an incredible group of people to work with.

The passion for and steadfast commitment of our facilitators, School and Environmental Education Center Coordinators, educators, Steering Committee Members, and partners and sponsors is extraordinary. Thanks to all of these individuals and organizations, 2019 was an extremely productive and exciting year for Florida PLT. We were thrilled to partner with the Florida Forest Service to provide PLT professional development training to 41 educators who attended the Florida Forestry Teachers' Tour. In partnership with environmental education consultants Vicki Crisp and

Barb Gugliotti, and through funding from the Florida Forest Service and the National PLT 2019 Model Program Initiative Grant, we correlated five of the PLT guides to the Florida standards, making it easier for teachers to incorporate activities into standards-based curriculum (see https://programs.ifas.ufl. edu/plt/curriculum/standards-correlations/

for more information). Our 2019 Advanced Professional Development Conference, Florida PLT Presents Growing Green Careers, was held in Lakeland November 1-3, and 73 participants (the largest number ever) were provided with training in green and forest careers-focused activities, opportunities for networking, and materials and resources (see page 8 for more information on our 2019 conference).

Our dedicated and wonderful facilitators are the heart of our program. In 2019, 45 facilitators led professional development trainings, training 800 formal and non-formal educators throughout Florida. We are beginning to expand into counties where PLT previously has had little to no exposure,

and we are so thankful to our facilitators for always stepping up to help. We were pleased to welcome 31 new facilitators in 2019, some of who joined us through the facilitator mentoring program and some who attended the facilitator training at the 2019 conference.

The 2019 Florida PLT Steering Committee is made up of members representing government agencies, forest industry, and formal and non-formal education. Steering Committee members (see https://programs. ifas.ufl.edu/plt/who-we-are/) contribute

considerable time

and provide essential input to guide the direction of the program. In June, the

Steering Committee gathered for a

2-day strategic planning retreat. The result was a 3-year strategic plan, outlining priority program areas, goals, objectives, and action items to spearhead our efforts over the next 3 years.

We thank our outstanding network for your hard work and support in 2019 and for helping PLT to reach its vision of creating a future where the next generation values the natural world and has the knowledge and skills to make informed decisions and take responsible actions to sustain forests and the broader environment. We look forward to a dynamic and successful year in 2020!

By the Numbers: 2019 Professional Development Trainings

In 2019, **45 professional development trainings** were conducted with **800 participants**. The following table provides a breakdown of the types of trainings.

Formal and non-formal educators trained by Florida PLT in 2019 reach an estimated **313,535 youth** annually.



2019 Florida PLT Awards

Each year, Florida Project Learning Tree (Florida PLT) recognizes a partner, facilitator, and educator who have made exceptional contributions to the program. This year, awardees include Shannon Brewer, City of Tarpon Springs, Partner of the Year; Dana Sussmann, Facilitator of the Year; Suzette Gagnon, Educator of the Year; and Robin Will, 2019 Bill Kleinhans Spirit of Florida PLT Award. Awards were presented at the Florida PLT Advanced Professional Development Conference, "Growing Green Careers," held in Lakeland, FL November 1-3, 2019.

Shannon Brewer, 2019 Florida PLT Partner of the Year

Shannon Brewer has been employed with the City of Tarpon Springs since 2007, originally working for the Parks Department. With continuing education, classes at the local college, and additional certification, she became a Florida Nursery Growers and Landscape Association (FNGLA) Certified Horticulturist in 2011 and an International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Certified Arborist in 2017. Shannon is currently the city's municipal arborist under the Building Department, and is also a FAA drone pilot. Shannon secured sponsorship funds from the City of Tarpon Springs for Florida

PLT professional development trainings for up to 100 new educators in the Tarpon Springs area. Through Shannon's guidance, two professional development trainings and one Teen 4 Trees event were sponsored in



2019. Shannon uses PLT activities to engage the public in conservation conversations during city events like Touch-A-Truck and Eco-Fest where over 600 trees have been given out this year.



Suzette Gagnon, 2019 Florida PLT Educator of the Year

Forestry Teachers' Tour.
Suzette's passion is to

find a connection between conservation and the extensive industrial and business needs of her community. These experiences led her to organize an annual "Forestry" unit for 4th graders that includes hands-on outdoor programs and PLT lessons. Suzette also created an outdoor classroom at her school (approximately seven acres of forest) that is used by all K-8 classes for lessons related to the environment and wetlands. She coordinates an environmental science center at her school that houses six native and non-native animal species for educational purposes, as well as a full-room mural of Strawberry Creek. Suzette has sponsored two school Green Apple Day of Service projects that have won project of the year, and she regularly invites guest speakers and plans extensive field trips (Jacksonville Zoo, St. Johns Riverkeeper tour, etc.) to help students have a realistic understanding of our unique Florida environment and the ways they can be good stewards. Suzette's goal for her school is to have an integrated program that promotes environmental stewardship and a culture of STEM for all students and educators with the long-term goal of having all the educators for the Diocese of St. Augustine trained in PLT.



Dana Sussmann, 2019 Florida PLT Facilitator of the Year

Dana Sussmann began her career as a Cooperative Forestry Assistance Forester in 1989 in South Florida, relocating to Central Florida in 1994. Dana provides rural forestry assistance to landowners in Orange, Osceola, Seminole, and Brevard counties. Additionally, she provides environmental education and urban forestry assistance to local communities. Dana is an International Society of Arboriculture Certified Arborist, a Certified Burner, and a Project Learning Tree Facilitator. Dana considers the opportunity to educate youth and adults about the positive impact forestland has on the quality of life and the economy a very rewarding part of her job. Her enthusiasm and professionalism is such an asset as a Florida PLT Facilitator.

Robin Will, 2019 Bill Kleinhans Spirit of Florida PLT Award

There is no one who has contributed more to Florida PLT than Robin Will. Robin is the Supervisory Refuge Ranger at St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge, and her leadership role for Florida PLT began in 1989 as a founding member of the Steering Committee. She has served on the Steering Committee for 30 years, 16 of those years as chair, providing continuity in leadership as the program went through many changes (home organization, coordinators, funding, etc.). Facilitating more than 130 trainings for preservice teachers and in-service educators, Robin has worked with groups from Florida State University, Florida A&M University, and Flagler College. Over the years, Robin has helped establish partnerships with agencies, industry, and

individuals who have committed support through donations and promotion of the program. Robin was instrumental in establishing and growing the Florida PLT School program. In Wakulla County, Florida, all public preschool and elementary schools are



Florida PLT Schools because of Robin's efforts. Robin was the recipient of the first Florida PLT Facilitator of the Year Award in 1992 and she was also awarded the National PLT Leadership in Education Award in 2018.



2019 National PLT Leadership in Education Award



PLT's Leadership in Education Award honors those who make significant contributions to advance PLT programs and initiatives at the state or regional level. Congratulations to Kirsten Brazier for being one of two recipients of the award in 2019!

Kirsten Brazier is a 1st grade teacher at a Title 1 school, Crawfordville Elementary School, in Wakulla County, Florida. She is passionate about using the outdoors to engage students in learning.

As the Florida PLT School Coordinator, Kirsten supports teachers in every grade in using Project Learning Tree lessons to connect children to nature. Kirsten encourages new faculty to attend Florida PLT trainings. She

organizes an annual PLT Week in which each class participates in various activities to grow awareness of environmental issues in their area.

Kirsten also plans and creates service-learning opportunities for students at her school and helps find funding for these projects. Students grow vegetables, herbs, and flowers in raised garden beds; they observe monarch caterpillars and

butterflies attracted to their butterfly garden; and they set up a school-wide recycling program and participate in Recycle-Bowl, a yearly competition organized by Keep America Beautiful in which students track the amount of trash they recycle in a month.





2019 Advanced Professional Development Conference:

Florida PLT Presents Growing Green Careers

The 2019 Florida PLT Advanced Professional Development Conference was held November 1-3, 2019 in Lakeland, Florida. The conference theme, *Growing Green Careers*, highlighted the importance of green jobs and the growth of this sector. The International Labour Organization

projects that there will be 60 million new green jobs worldwide by 2030 (2017), and at the same time, people are passionate about doing more to protect our planet, creating an opportunity to highlight the role of forests, forest management, and viable career pathways supporting both (Patel, 2017, "11 Environmental Causes Gen Z Is Passionate About." Forbes).

Seventy-three participants attended the training—making it our largest conference yet! Participants included elementary, middle, and high school teachers; early childhood educators; school district staff; college/university professors; non-formal educators; preservice teachers; forest industry representatives; foresters; and natural resource professionals.

Our conference theme, **Growing Green Careers**, focused on the importance of green jobs and the critical need to educate today's youth about the variety of careers available in this field.

Program highlights included exploration of activities from the *PreK-8 Environmental Education Activity Guide* and the new *Green Jobs: Exploring Forest Careers Guide*; Field tours at Circle B Bar Reserve; a Pathways to Green Careers Panel Discussion; an awards dinner; and facilitator and educator

professional development trainings.

Following the conference, an evaluation survey was sent to all conference participants. Fifty-six participants responded, yielding a 77% response rate. Evaluation responses were overwhelmingly positive; some of the key findings are summarized below.



- 89% of respondents reported that the conference "exceeded" or "far exceeded" their expectations.
- 98% of respondents were "satisfied" or "extremely satisfied" with the organization of the conference agenda and the "Growing Green Careers" theme.
- 100% of respondents were "satisfied" or "extremely satisfied" with:
 - the quality of instruction;
 - the effort to involve/engage all participants; and
 - opportunities to network with other participants.
- When asked to provide general comments on the conference sessions, participants said:
 - "As a newbie to both [non]formal education and PLT, I thought this was a great conference."
 - "It was outstanding. I always learn something new that I can add to my knowledge and ability as a facilitator."
 - "The panel discussion was very informative. Teachers need more exposure to the depth of 'green careers'."
- When asked "please describe how you plan to apply knowledge and resources attained at the conference," participants said:
 - "We all left feeling excited and empowered to continue to explore all the PLT activities and continue to be creative in developing our own variations."
 - "To be a sounding board for the value PLT brings to the understanding of our environmental resources as a sustainable source of jobs and goods."
 - "I plan to add an emphasis on green careers to our annual PLT week."
 - "I would like to use the Green Jobs curriculum to start a high school program at our facility."
 - "I would like to recruit others to become PLT teachers and use the resources to motivate our students to get outdoors and love nature."

Florida PLT Standards Correlations

In 2019, we completed correlations of five of the PLT curriculum guides to Florida Standards. Standards are listed by activity for each curriculum guide and include coding for level of activity (reinforces a primary concept/idea; teaches the concept/idea; or teaches the concept/idea and requires demonstration of practice) and level of complexity (i.e., level of cognitive complexity as determined by C-Palms), as well as links to the standard on the C-Palms web site.

Activities in the *PreK-8 Environmental Education Activity Guide* as well as the *Focus on Forests* and *Places We Live*

Secondary Modules are correlated to the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards for Science and Social Studies and Florida Standards for Language Arts and Mathematics.

Activities in the Southeastern Forests and Climate Change Secondary Module are correlated to the Next Generation Sunshine State Standards for Science.

Activities in the *Environmental Experiences for Early Childhood Guide* are correlated to the Florida Early Learning and Developmental Standards for ages 3-4 years and 4 years-Kindergarten.


- 45 facilitators and other volunteers provided PLT professional development training to educators in Florida.
